Improving Capacity of Kadugli Hospital			
Kadugli District, South Kordofan State, Sudan; Kadugli is the capital city of South Kordofan State, Sudan. It is located 240km south of El-Obeid, at the northern edge of the White Nile plain in the Nuba Mountains.			
Partner's History/Relationship with the Project:			
<p>Sudan faces numerous crises, including ongoing conflict and political instability, large internally displaced persons (IDPs) and refugee populations, slow and sudden onset disasters exacerbated by climate change, disease outbreaks, and an on-going situation of recession and high inflation, that has left 13.4 million Sudanese in need of humanitarian assistance as of March 2021. This is 4.1 million more than June 2020 and the highest level in 10 years despite progress made in the implementation of the objectives of the 39-month transition period and the peace progress. The total population is estimated to be 43 million, with 15% of the population under 5, and 23% adolescents 10-19 years of age.</p> <p>The Sudan health system has staff and medicine shortages, particularly at the locality level and rural areas leading to extreme inequities in access to health services. In fact, nearly 70% of the health workforce live in urban settings, thus serving only 30% of the population and 67% of health providers are employed at hospitals versus 33% in local health centers serving most communities. This already extremely stretched health system and supply chain have been further stressed by COVID-19. In the last year, the number of functioning primary health care centers (PHCs) decreased by 40% and the economic crisis has led to a 200% increase in the cost of health services. In addition to COVID-19, Sudan was combating multiple disease outbreaks in 2020: malaria reached epidemic levels in 11 states and the re-emergence of polio in at least 7 states.</p> <p>Sudan suffers from inadequate and deteriorating water supply infrastructure, which is worsening livelihoods, quality of life, disease burden, and gender inequities. Progress on sanitation coverage is hampered by being a low priority for citizens, a lack of affordable and desirable sanitation products, accepted social norms around open defecation, and a lack of clarity and prioritization by government authorities. IDPs and refugees are populations in particular need of water, hygiene and sanitation (WASH) services in Sudan due to the recent outbreaks of waterborne diseases and overall poor services in settlements. WASH and nutrition services are primarily dependent on humanitarian interventions, e.g., humanitarian partners in conflict-affected areas provide more than 70% of the health services.</p> <p>IMA World Health has been implementing the USAID funded Moving Integrated, Quality Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health and Family Planning and Reproductive Health Services to Scale (MOMENTUM) Integrated Health Resilience (MIHR) project in Sudan since 2021. This project is designed to strengthen quality voluntary family planning and reproductive, maternal, newborn, child, and adolescent health (FP/RMNCAH) service delivery and build health resilience in fragile settings. It is part of USAID's MOMENTUM suite of awards, which ensures that investments in USAID partner countries along the humanitarian-development nexus are tailored to country contexts and foster sustainability.</p>			

Description of Project

Name of Project and Purpose (*agricultural, health, water, micro-credit, education, community development, etc.- and how it might address at least one of the 17 United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals 2015-2030*):

The Improving Capacity of Kadugli Hospital project will support and enhance the MIHR project's goal to increase the capacity of Sudan institutions to plan sustainability, and manage and maintain quality maternal, neonatal, child health (MNCH) and WASH services. This project will work with the Kadugli Hospital to improve their infrastructure including improvement of WASH facilities and provision of needed medical equipment. This project will address the Good Health and Well-Being SDG.

Target Population (*children, women, farmers, urban poor, etc.- priority will be given to projects that enable the empowerment of women and children*):

The target population of this project is men, women and children living in and around Kadugli, Sudan. Because Kadugli is a hospital providing Maternal and Child Health (MNCH) services as well as Emergency Obstetric and Newborn Care (EmONC) services women and children are particularly targeted.

How many persons are/will be served? (*please give as specific a figure as possible*)?

Kadugli Hospital serves a population of 115,249 people and 45 medical staff, including medical doctors, mid-level health providers and pharmacists working at the facility.

Key Objectives:

IMA completed assessment of four health facilities in the Kadugli District in South Kordofan State, Sudan. It was determined that Kadugli Hospital is most in need of additional support to achieve this project's key objective:

- To strengthen the capacity of Kadugli Hospital to improve delivery of quality health care services by addressing the shortage of medical supplies and equipment, improvement and rehabilitation of the roof, latrines, and WASH infrastructure. Infrastructure improvements will be prioritized to facilitate improved service delivery.

Kadugli Hospital is a teaching hospital located in Kadugli, Sudan. It is the only health facility in the area that is open 24 hours a day with staffing 7 days a week. The hospital contains 30 general admission beds, 8 maternity beds, 8 delivery beds and 0 Newborn Baby Intensive Care (NICU) beds. Even though the hospital is lacking NICU beds they provide NICU services. The hospital does have ramps for moving these patient beds. While Kadugli Hospital provides Antenatal Care (ANC), Postnatal Care (PNC), EmONC, and delivery services, the hospital does not provide advanced resuscitation services and refers cases to the pediatric hospital across the street. Kadugli Hospital receives referral patients from 32 facilities and sends transportation as needed however, roads leading to the facility are poor and unpaved. The hospital is the only health facility in the area that provides medicines in case of an emergency, however, their supply of such medicines is insufficient. Kadugli Hospital is in great need of roof repairs as the roof is caving in in some areas. The hospital is one of three facilities in the area that have a power supply of grid electricity or solar as well as a backup generator, but they still lack an adequate supply of electricity. While the hospital is the only facility to have piped water the capacity for water storage is limited and there are frequent interruptions to their water supply.
